At our 2018 Synod Assembly delegates engaged in some challenging conversations and exercises that identified how racialized differences, and the lack thereof, impacts the life of our church and its congregations. It accentuated the need for a better understanding of who we are as a predominantly white church and how we can engage and welcome a more diverse group of people in a good way.

In support of the ELCIC's strategic goal to foster Reconciled Relationships, the Synod Assembly mandated the establishment of a Racial Justice Advisory Committee to lead us in this important work. The following article highlights some of the actions currently underway to do just that. In addition, we are recognizing February as Black History Month by highlighting some ex-

traordinary men and women who have contributed much to our past and present history both in Canada and the United States.

I encourage you to participate in the online discussion, "PROJECT STORY" and, if you are able, to consider joining our visit to the Buxton, Ontario Historic Site, one of Canada's first Underground Railroad communities that became home and refuge for many of the first slaves to escape the U.S. southern slave owners.

## **BLACK HISTORY MONTH**

\*...."Black History Month is a time to remember and reflect on important people and events of the past-and the present-and to continue to work toward a better, fairer future."

The commemoration of Black History Month dates back to 1926, when Harvard-educated African American historian, Carter G. Woodson, proposed setting aside a time devoted to honour the accomplishments of African Americans and, now, includes African Canadians and African descendants around the world. Originally, it was to heighten awareness of Black History in the U.S. For many, it is an opportunity to learn and acknowledge the contributions to the world by African descendants which is not often captured or taught in the annals of universal history.

### **\*\*Other notable and famous Black Canadians include:**

**Willie Eldon O'Ree**, CM ONB (born October 15, 1935) is a Canadian former professional ice hockey player, known best for being the first black player in the National Hockey League. O'Ree played as a winger for the Boston

Bruins. Often referred to as the "Jackie Robinson of ice hockey" due to breaking the black colour barrier in the sport, and has stated publicly that he had met Jackie Robinson twice in his younger years. He was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in November 2018.

Also in 2018, the NHL instituted the annual Willie O'Ree Community Hero Award in his honour, to "recognize the individual who has worked to make a positive impact on his or her community, culture or society to make people better through hockey."

**Ferguson Arthur "Fergie" Jenkins** CM (born December 13, 1942) is a Canadian former professional baseball pitcher and coach. He played Major League Baseball for the Philadelphia Phillies, Chicago Cubs, Texas Rangers and Boston Red Sox (1965–1983). Jenkins played the majority of his career for the Cubs.

**Lincoln MacCauley Alexander**, PC CC OOnt CD QC (January 21, 1922 – October 19, 2012) was a Canadian lawyer who became the first black Member of Parliament in the House of Commons, the first black federal Cabinet Minister (serving as federal Minister of Labour) and the first black Chair of the Worker's .

**Michaëlle Jean** PC CC CMM COM CD( born September 6, 1957) is a Canadian stateswoman and former journalist who was the third Secretary-General of the Organisation internationale and first Black Governor General of Canada.

### **\*\*Notable Historic Black African-Americans Include:**

**Harriet Tubman** (code name: "Moses") born into slavery , was a famous abolitionist renowned for her exploits in guiding her fellow slaves to freedom in the north on the Underground Railroad.

**George Washington Carver** (January, 1864-January 5, 1943); born into slavery, taught at Tuskegee Institute and became one of the most prominent Agricultural scientists and inventors of his time.

**Madam C. J. Walker** (December 23, 1867-May 25, 1919); African-American entrepreneur, Philanthropist and political and social activist.

**Rosa Parks** (February 4, 1913–October 24, 2005); was a civil rights activist who refused to surrender her seat to a white passenger on a segregated bus in Montgomery, Alabama.

**Martin Luther King Jr.** (1929-1968); the most important voice of the American civil rights movement. He was famous for using nonviolent resistance to overcome injustice, and he never got tired of trying to end segregation laws. He also did all he could to make people realize that "all men are created equal." In 1964 he received the Nobel Peace Prize. He was assassinated at the age of 39 years old.




## ELFEC Seeks Executive Director

### **Thank You For Your Generous Offerings in 2019!**

This report provides a pre-audit summary of offerings for various church-wide causes that were remitted to the synod office by congregations and individuals throughout 2019. In next month's report, "*The Synod's 2019 Financial Story*", I will provide a more comprehensive financial picture of the past year, including operating fund details (e.g. income, expenditures on synodical ministries and the resulting surplus/deficit) as well as other financial highlights.

Although from time to time we may tend to bemoan our apparent lack of financial and other resources, Bishop Michael and others have reminded us that we are the wealthiest Christians who have ever lived. Once again, as we look back on 2019, it is evident that we as a synod have so much for which to be grateful!

In total, offerings received through the synod office were approximately the same as those received in the previous year. However, when looking more closely at specific designations, as usual, there were a few "ups and downs" in 2019 compared to 2018.

On behalf of the Eastern Synod Council, "**Thank You**" to you, the members and friends of the 182 congregations that comprise our synod, for your generous gifts over the past year. Through this partnership, you fund a variety of vibrant and vital ministries within the Eastern Synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, thus extending the reach of your congregation's mission across Canada and the world.

#### **Benevolence Offerings**

General Benevolence offerings represent the primary source of funding for the synod's operating budget. In 2019 these offerings increased by almost 3%, a most welcome, upward blip when viewed in the context of the more usual year-over-year declines that have formed the overall trend over much of the past quarter century.

## **Canadian Lutheran World Relief Offerings**

Offerings to Canadian Lutheran World Relief consist of gifts to general/undesignated CLWR and gifts to CWLR special appeals/projects. Unfortunately, the \$13,000 increase in offerings to CLWR special appeals/projects was more than offset by a decrease of \$22,000 in CLWR general/undesignated giving. As a result, total offerings for Canadian Lutheran World Relief decreased by slightly more than 3% in 2019 compared to the previous year.

## **Offerings to Other Eastern Synod and ELCIC Ministries**

2019 remittances to other designated ministries were generally lower compared to the previous year (refer to "Summary of Total Offerings Received" section below for details). These declines included offerings designated for the ELCIC Reformation Challenge and Martin Luther University College, results that aren't overly surprising given that the major appeals that were initiated several years ago in these areas are now winding down.

## **Summary of Total Offerings Received**

Offerings to all causes decreased by slightly more than \$10,000 (-0.7%) in 2019 compared to the previous year. Although we would obviously prefer to see an increase, I would suggest that we view these relatively flat results as positive news in light of the significant financial challenges that a number of congregations are facing.

Giving to various designated causes was as follows:
