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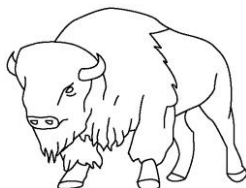
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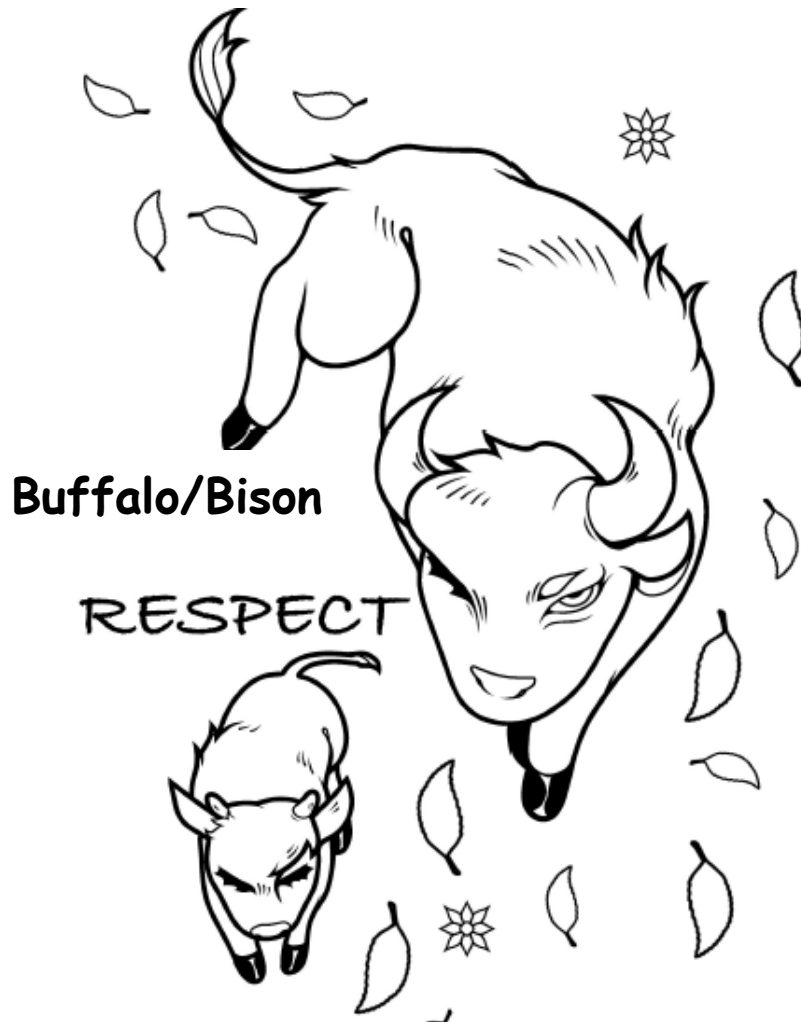

Artist: Erin Anderson-Bruce, Poplar River First Nation. Poplar River First Nation is located 450 kilometres from Winnipeg on the east side of Lake Winnipeg, at the mouth of the Poplar River. It is home to about 2,000 residents and this area has been occupied for at least 7,000 years.

Respect is represented by the buffalo. The buffalo gives every part of its being to sustain the human way of living, not because it is of less value, but because it respects the balance and needs of others.

To honour all creation is to have respect. Live honourably in teachings and in your actions towards all things.

Do not waste and be mindful of the balance of all living things. Share and give away what you do not need.

Treat others the way you would like to be treated. Do not be hurtful to yourself or others.

“...let us seek to better understand the Sacred Teaching of Respect as it relates to the land, waters and skies. In the Blackfoot language, Respect is iniiyimm. In Cree, it is kihceyihtakwan. In Michif, miyootootow. Though our words differ, the understood importance of caring for our world is the same.”
