Dear Colleague and Partners, Grace and peace be with you!

In the most recent series of meetings that I have convened with the rostered ministers of our synod, we have discussed potential scenarios by which in -person worship might begin in our churches as provincial restrictions begin to be lifted. Many of us, while mourning the absence of in-person worship, have grave concerns about our congregational capacity to ensure a safe and healthy environment in which to gather should current government restrictions be relaxed anytime within the next few months.

Early last week the Anglican House of Bishops in the Province of Ontario decided that their churches will not reopen for in person worship until September 2020 at the earliest, regardless of where the Government of Ontario is with its reopening plan. This decision was made in consultation with public health experts, with the well-being and safety of parishioners and the communities they serve uppermost in their hearts and minds. I have also clearly heard that our pastors and deacons would welcome a directive of this kind. As such, it is my strong recommendation that our synod's congregations not contemplate initiating in-person worship experiences within our church buildings until the beginning of September at the earliest.

I fully recognize that the four provincial jurisdictions that our synod encompasses will each establish different schedules for the easing of restrictions. In addition, it is possible that regional distinctions might be established within individual provinces. Still, I believe that there is great value in all of us anticipating a more distant horizon for potential reopening than we might be hoping for.

For almost three months now we have been physically distancing from one another for the love of our neighbour. That same motivation needs to be paramount as we plan for the future. I encourage you to use these coming months as an opportunity to plan and put in place comprehensive plans for what in-person worship will look like once we have decided that it is both prudent and safe to physically gather in our church buildings once again. It is my intention to provide our rostered and congregational leaders with resources to help in that process in the

coming weeks.

I am also hoping that our rostered leaders will take much needed vacation time over these summer months and be encouraged to do so by their congregational leaders. Our ELCIC Bishops and Assistants to the Bishop are preparing a series of video and text sermons that can be accessed for each Sunday from June 14 through to September 13 to help ease the burden.

I have been profoundly moved and deeply inspired by the faithful witness that our leaders and congregations have provided during these immensely challenging days. You have responded to the pandemic with dexterity, generosity and deep faithfulness. You have made it abundantly clear that although our church buildings are not open for public worship, the church has not closed. In many ways, it has never been more open! The Spirit, whose descent we marked just days ago on the feast of Pentecost, is alive and active and is working among and through us.

May God continue to bless us with abundant gifts of hope, forbearance and patience as we navigate the significant decisions and choices that will need to be made going forward. Peace be with you!

2020 Benevolence Offerings Show Slight Decline

Financial Update (as of May 31st, 2020)

Given the severe impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, it's not overly surprising that 2020 benevolence offerings have declined compared to the same period for 2019. However, the 7% year-to-date decrease that shows in our books as of May 31st is relatively small when viewed in the context of the drastic changes that we as individuals and congregations have experienced in our lives over the last three months.

Offerings designated for Canadian Lutheran World Relief have been impacted much more significantly, decreasing by 24%.

We as a synod are blessed! Thank you for continuing to demonstrate your faithfulness allowing the ministries of the synod to continue during these unprecedented times!

ELFEC Appoints New ExecutiveDirector

ELFEC announced the appointment of Mr. Lee Gould as Executive Director (E.D.) of ELFEC, effective June 1, 2020.

Jeff Pym, E.D. since the foundation was established in 2007, announced in 2019 that he would be retiring effective June 30, 2020. Since January the ELFEC Board of Directors has been engaged in a thorough search for a suitable successor, and in Lee Gould they believe they have found the leader who can guide ELFEC through the future phases of its growth, development and service.

Lee is an accomplished and experienced not-for-profit executive, having spent three decades working in the sector. For the past seven years he was President and CEO of the Canadian Medical Foundation. Prior to that he held senior leadership positions at Lakehead University and several hospital foundations.

Lee has already begun a period of orientation with the ELFEC staff. Kathryn Smith, Krista Kuehnbaum and Jeff will spend the next few weeks introducing Lee to the programs and people who make ELFEC's mission both exciting and rewarding.

The 40 quilt blocks tell the stories of victims and offenders in two minute clips.



DONOR RECOGNITION

As I am writing this, we are at the two-month anniversary of social isolation and our personal experiences with the coronavirus, COVID-19. We have witnessed great sacrifice, and seen people helping each other. We have learned to be patient with the situation and with each other. We have re-connected, and we have re-evaluated what is important to us. It has been an unexpected journey and it is difficult to know where we will be in the next few weeks. You may be in an area that is slowly opening up, or you may be in a situation where it is still vitally important to maintain physical distancing. Whatever your circumstances, may you find comfort and peace, knowing that God cares for each one of you and is living these days with you.

During this time, our congregations have been thrown into the job of re-imagining how to be the church. As individuals, we may find ourselves re-evaluating our lives and what is important – what connections are important, who do we want to spend time with, where do we see ourselves in the future? Lawyer Katherine Crighton notes that people "have been contacting the law office to update their wills and powers of attorney in light of COVID-19." She says it is because "people want to be prepared." (Waterloo Record, March 31, 2020) I would think that many of us were Not prepared for COVID-19, but understanding the severity of the situation, we may have looked at our Will and Power of Attorney documents to confirm that they were up to date and accurately reflected the legacy we want to leave.

If you are like me, you have a new appreciation of what your church is doing during this difficult time and understand that they are doing it with limited resources. Would it not be nice if each church could have a pool of funds that they could access in these situations, so that they could quickly respond to changing circumstances? The good news is, there is a way and it begins with you. By remembering the church through your will, you will be supporting your church so that in the future, it does have the resources it requires in order to keep providing 'essential services' during changing times.

Since our last update, ELFEC has recorded 64 gifts from 39 individuals or families. These gifts have a realized amount of \$676,972, with additional \$167,740 in gifts expectancies (meaning that these are gifts that have been arranged, but no cash has been received yet). Many of these are second or third gifts from people who have been on our donor list for years.

I'd like to thank and recognize the following who are new Friends of Lutheran Planned Giving, who have remembered the church with a planned gift through a gift in their will, a gift of investments, or in another way.
