From Canada To Ethiopia

In January it was my privilege to participate in the CLWR Global Encounter 2016 to Ethiopia. Part of a group of 25 ELCIC and LC-C members from across Canada. These people are passionate about the work of this specialized agency committed to challenging the causes and responding to the consequences of human suffering and poverty. As Vice-President of the CLWR Board as well as being a donor myself, I feel it's important to experience how gifts given to CLWR are used responsibly in serving the needs of others. Thankfully and unequivocally, I can say they most certainly are.

I write this less than two weeks after returning home. I came home feeling overwhelmed emotionally and spiritually. Physically, too, to be honest.

There is so much I could focus on as I write to you now. The warmth and hospitality of the Ethiopian people touched me on many levels. The stark beauty of the Ethiopian landscape. How can I forget the mystery and awe of the Lalibela churches which were hewn from the rock almost a thousand years ago. Some seven storeys high. I was pleased to learn of the peaceful co-existence between Christians and Muslims in this great country, something we don't always see in our world. How could I not mention the Timket celebration that we attended in Addis Ababa. Timket is the celebration of the Epiphany in the Ethiopian Orthodox Church calendar. The event we attended was full of music and dance, a joyous celebration of the God who loves us all, the God who calls for the unity of all people. Of course, the humourous and ironic were well represented. I can laugh, now, as I almost got arrested outside the American Embassy. Shouldn't have taken that photo. Resident of Stratford that I am, listening to the music of Justin Bieber coming out of a little pool hall in Lalibela brought a smile to my face. The global world we live in.

Despite all this, it was why we went in the first place that touched me most of all. To see the work of CLWR. In a part of the world which is so vulnerable, CLWR is making a life-giving difference. Some of you will not know this but Ethiopia is in the midst of one of the worst droughts in its history. Most likely caused by El Nino, this has created extremely dry conditions, which is devastating for the people who depend on the spring and summer rains to grow their crops. More than 10 million people need support. An estimated 400,000 children are at risk of developing severe acute malnutrition this year. And CLWR is there.

Here is some of what we saw : Working with our partners, CLWR is helping to diversify the pastoral livelihoods of target groups in a sustainable way thereby contributing to the enhancement and attainment of food security for the most vulnerable; natural resource conservation practices are being promoted and taught; irrigation schemes are being developed; trees are being planted; farmers, women as well as men, are being trained in best nutrition practices; how to conduct dairy farming and

artificial insemination so herds can be increased and excess product sold to benefit the community. I continue to marvel how just a little bit of water well-directed can produce abundant crops of carrots, tomatoes, potatoes, Swiss chard, garlic, peppers, papaya, apples and so much more.

Let me repeat. CLWR is making a difference, a positive difference, a life-changing difference. That's what we went to see and experience and we most certainly did.

The vision of Canadian Lutheran World Relief is to work for a "world where people live in justice, peace, and dignity, united in diversity, and empowered to achieve their universal rights to basic needs and quality of life." Your prayers and financial gifts allow this to happen. I have seen it firsthand. May they continue. Together, we can make a difference, In the name of the God who loves us all.

Report of the Treasurer

2015 Final (Pre-Audit)

Benevolence Offerings



I am very pleased to report that for the first time since 2007, the synod reported a notable increase in benevolence offerings received from congregations and individuals. Given the declining trend that we have seen in recent years, news of this \$44,000 (3%) increase in support of the synod's various ministries is very much appreciated!

Canadian Lutheran World Relief Offerings

Total offerings to Canadian Lutheran World Relief declined slightly (2%) in 2015 compared to the previous year. Due to meaningful responses to both the Nepal Earthquake (\$50,500) and Syrian Refugee (\$62,600) appeals, offerings to CLWR designated causes almost tripled (from \$53,000 in 2014 to \$149,000 in 2015). This was offset by a decline of more than \$100,000 in non-designated CLWR receipts. (It should be noted that 2014 non-designated CLWR giving included a one-time congregational gift of \$81,000).

Offerings to Other Eastern Synod and ELCIC Causes

Congregations and individuals also designated smaller amounts for ELCIC Global Mission, the ELCIC Praise Appeal, Waterloo Lutheran Seminary, our three synodical camps, Lutheran Campus Ministry, Canadian missions, St. Peter's Kitchener Television Ministry as well as several other causes.

We congratulate Sydney Marshall, our fourth-year student who is completing a double major in [Christian Studies and Global Citizenship](#) and in Spanish, who is the first recipient of the Women of Faith Scholarship.

Sydney received the \$500 award during a special luncheon in Keffer Chapel on Feb. 5. She is on track to be the first graduate of the seminary's new undergraduate program.

And we give our heartfelt thanks to the women who made this new scholarship possible. The Women of Faith Scholarship Fund is one of a number of projects flowing from the [Women of Faith Fund](#) which was established in 2011 after the Evangelical Lutheran Women, a national



organization of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, disbanded.

Our Christian Studies and Global Citizenship Bachelor of Arts program accepted its first students in the fall of 2012. There are 11 students enrolled in the undergrad program.

In addition to our students, each year roughly 242 students from across the Laurier campus take undergrad courses, as electives, at the seminary.
