



Report of the Treasurer
2017 Final (Pre-Audit)

Measured in terms of total offerings that were remitted to the synod for regular (undesignated) benevolence and various designated causes, 2017 wasn't a banner year. Rather, 2017 remittances were consistent with the slowly declining trend that has been evident in the synod's financial statements over the past twenty years or so.

During these challenging financial times, it is especially important that I convey my deepest thanks and appreciation to 184 congregations and to numerous individuals across the synod for the most generous gifts that you have made over the past year. Through this partnership you fund a variety of vibrant and important ministries of the Eastern Synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, extending the reach of your congregation's mission across Canada and the world. Your gifts are a blessing! And through your generosity we as a synod have been blessed!

This month my report provides a high level summary of offerings designated for various causes that were remitted to the synod by congregations and individuals over the past year. Next month's report will provide a more comprehensive review of the synod's 2017 financial picture - income, expenditures on synodical ministries and the resulting surplus/deficit in the synod's operating fund, as well as other financial highlights from the past year (including several large gifts and bequests that were designated for synodical ministries).

Benevolence Offerings

Benevolence offerings received in 2017 declined by 1.5% or approximately \$22,000 compared to those that were remitted in 2016. Furthermore, the 2017 budget was based on a 1% increase (\$14,000) resulting in a total shortfall of approximately \$36,000. Fortunately we were able to offset this shortfall through under-spending in several areas of the budget and through returns on investments held by the Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada that exceeded budget expectations.

I would like to offer a special thank you to those congregations that added to their benevolence offerings by including a special amount to help cover the synod's cost of sending delegates to the 2017 ELCIC National Convention, an expense that in previous years was a congregational responsibility. You have set a great example of leadership!

Canadian Lutheran World Relief Offerings

In total, undesignated and designated offerings to Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR) declined by 10% in 2017 compared to the previous year. 70% of all CLWR offerings were undesignated while the large majority of the remaining 30% of designated offerings were directed towards African famine relief and related causes.

Offerings to Other Eastern Synod and ELCIC Ministries

In addition to Benevolence and CLWR, congregations and individuals also designated lesser amounts to support a variety of other ministries (see Summary of Offerings Received section below for details). In total, offerings to these other causes were virtually unchanged from 2016 to 2017.

With almost \$83,000 being donated to the ELCIC's Reformation Challenge in 2017, the synod's total over the past two years falls just shy of \$200,000, an amount that excludes funds that were retained by congregations in support of their own refugee sponsorship/resettlement projects. What a tremendous response! 70% of the Reformation Challenge donations that flowed through the synod office over the past two years were designated for scholarships for schools of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. The amount raised to date from our synod will fund scholarships for 95 students!

Total offerings remitted to the synod decreased ~\$57,000 (3%) in 2017 compared to the previous year:

A New Church Born

November 20, 2013 marked the beginning into a journey of dreaming between two congregations in Guelph; St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church and St. David & St. Patrick's Anglican Church. That evening a simple dinner invitation brought representatives from St. Paul's to St. David & St. Patrick's together to share a meal and entertain ecumenical ministry possibilities for the near future. In recent years, the two congregations had extended themselves into the occasional pulpit exchange as well as a yearly shared service. Despite this somewhat limited exposure, commonalities began to emerge particularly with the Church's true mission and outreach into the community. At that November meeting, bold individuals were willing to dream differently. Propelled by possibilities, in addition to financial realities, a proposal to begin talks on a new congregational model between the two churches was agreed upon both on a local level and the Lutheran Eastern Synod and the Niagara Anglican Diocese.

That winter, representatives and clergy from both congregations began to define what that congregational model might look like. Although potential possibilities of ministry as one body drove many of the conversations, one could not ignore the "Lutheran" and "Anglican" labels. Some obstacles were very real. Although the National churches have been in full communion since 2001, as defined in the Waterloo Declaration, governance models are very dif-

ferent. Tradition and personal church attachments also played a role.

A few months later, in April of 2014, Bishop Bird of the Anglican Diocese and Bishop Pryse of the Lutheran Eastern Synod met in Guelph with councils, clergy, and wardens to present their views and answer a list of standing questions. Their support and resources would play a central role and anchor point to conversations moving forward. A formal task force between the two local churches was established and carried these conversations into 2015. Amid many questions, a basic education of specific terms and practices of both churches was begun. It's quite amazing how many assumptions we carry. We had to learn a common language.

In the spring of 2015, both congregations formally voted to enter a two-year partnership agreement and St. David & St. Patrick's moved all of its resources to St. Paul's. This was determined after evaluation of both physical properties and abiding finances. During this time, both communities lived, worked, and prayed together with the hope of creating a permanent shared Anglican-Lutheran ministry that would result in a long-term covenantal and

legal relationship. It truly was a time of an engagement between two individuals.

A dedicated transition team was established which provided a bridge between the two governance models and provided a hub where existing teams or committees could talk and plan. This team was facilitated with support from the Anglican Diocese of Niagara and the Eastern Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada. Eventually a Joint Council was formed and ran parallel to the traditional governance models.

Following congregational votes on April 30th, 2017, both churches were excited to announce that they accepted a formal merger agreement that would see a new church born to serve the people of Guelph. This new church is called All Saint's Lutheran Anglican Church. It was one to be celebrated as it created the potential for us all to dream differently in our ministry. It wasn't the fact that we reached some kind of finish line but rather we were at a new epiphany, a new beginning point...a new opportunity in mission.

Christians across Canada are giving up practices that hurt the environment

Grace Lutheran is excited to be participating in Give it up for the Earth!, a Lenten climate change campaign from Citizens for Public Justice (CPJ). Through Give it up for the Earth!, Canadian Christians will commit to reducing their greenhouse gas emissions during the 40 days of Lent from February 13 March 29, 2018. They will also call on the federal government to match and exceed these actions with policy changes that will move Canada further and faster towards international climate change goals.

"We are excited to be involved in the CPJ "Give it up for the Earth" postcard campaign this Lent and to further explore issues facing all of us here in Hamilton" said Pastor Loretta Jaunzarins

Across Canada, over 110 groups (including churches, religious congregations, high schools, universities, and faith-based organizations) are gathering to make their pledges and sign postcards. The postcards are addressed to Minister of the Environment and Climate Change Catherine McKenna. They call on Canada to end subsidies to the fossil fuel industry right way.

"Climate change is increasingly understood as an issue of faith. The way we live in this world is an expression of the belief that we are called to protect and care for the Earth," says Karri Munn-Venn, senior policy analyst at CPJ. "Lent offers an opportunity to make a meaningful sacrifice while also making our voices heard. Even Catherine McKenna, Minister of the Environment and Climate Change, was encouraged by the initiative when we presented it to her last year!"

CPJ has already distributed over 15,000 postcards to groups across the country. Later this spring, postcards that have been returned to CPJ will be presented to Minister McKenna.
