The Challenge Of September

I don't know about you but when September rolls around, a predictable battle surfaces in my life. It is the battle associated with re-engagement. Summer is over - more or less. The fall schedule starts to move into high gear. Responsibility begins tugging at my sleeve and I want nothing more than to resist. I want to hold onto the illusion that I can remain on holidays permanently and be answerable to nothing and nobody. I want to avoid living under any external claims upon my life.

Usually there is enough space in the summer months to find opportunity to "kick back" and enjoy some of those lazy, hazy days associated with this time of year. And it is possible, when this happens, to think we are most alive in these moments. What is more, we get plenty of affirmation from the culture that tells us this is the way it should be. So, when September and the fall schedule call us back

to our roles and responsibilities, the internal battle begins.

But the battle has even larger implications. One of the writers I have been reading over the summertime pointed out that one of the great fictions of our age is the notion of a person without a role. It is the idea that we are most fully moral when we have divested ourselves of all external claims upon ourselves. But, the writer argued, this is fiction. The liberal self, detached from any history or any claim upon the self other than the claims one has personally chosen, does not exist. All of us are busy being determined by something. Even the claim that I am living only "for myself" is an externally imposed claim fostered by the current culture. So, he argued, the question is not, "Will I serve some purpose larger than myself?", for freedom from such determination is impossible. The question is, "Will the master whom I serve be true or false?"

So when it comes right down to it, my little battle associated with September has far greater implications. The challenge of September is actually calling me back to the realization that as a baptized Christian, I have been grasped by something greater than myself. I am owned, claimed, commandeered, if you will, for larger purposes. I am called to speak and enact the word of God among God's people and in the world. It is a reality that never goes on holiday. It is a reality that gives meaning and purpose to my life. When I am en-

gaged in this vocation I am most fully alive. I might suggest that the same is true for you.

What is more, when all of us in the church allow our lives to be so grasped by this external claim upon our lives as the community of the baptized, then the church also comes alive and the work of the Holy Spirit can begin once more to work the marvelous deeds of the kingdom through us.

Yes, summer is nearly over, the fall schedule is heating up and the call of the Word of God is anxious, once again, to lay its claim upon our lives. How shall we respond?

## Reformation 500

The six LCC and ELCIC Lutheran Churches in London On. through their Foundation, Lutheran Social Services (London) are sponsoring a festival event to celebrate Reformation 500.

The event will be held at St. Paul's Anglican Cathedral in London on **Sunday October 22<sup>nd</sup> 2017 at 3.30pm.** Organ and brass with timpani, and a senior youth choir will lead the singing of topical hymns/tunes by the various Reformers and Psalm paraphrases from various sources. Many will be based on Psalm 46. All will have familiar or quickly picked up tunes! This is not a worship service; it is a Festival of song with a presentation on Martin Luther.

The presentation will be by Lutheran scholar Dr. Christine Helmer. Dr. Helmer is the Arthur E. Andersen Teaching and Research Professor at Northwestern University. She is also Professor of Religious Studies and German. She is one of the leading scholars of Luther in the world. She has published widely in the area of the historical Luther and the global Luther, and is currently completing a book entitled *The Revisionist Luther*. Her MOOC (massive open online course) on "Luther and the West" will launch (for free) with Coursera on Oct. 3, 2016. In this talk she will speak of Luther and his relevance to us at this time.

We expect to arrange for dedicated parking near the Cathedral. Full details will be sent to all congregations within about 2-hours of London, nearer the time. Please mark this date on your calendar.

Making a gift to the church in your will can put legs on a dream. It's surprisingly easy to turn a vision for the future of your church into a legacy of faith.



**2017 marks the 500th anniversary of the day Luther nailed his theses on the church door in Wittenberg calling for the Church to reform itself. The ELCIC Program Committee for Worship (PCW) has put out a call for door images evoking reformation from across the church to be used on worship bulletin covers for the 2016-2017 liturgical year.**

**The images can be of doors of any sort.** The church door in Wittenberg was the bulletin board of the day. Doors combined with other symbols of the church or the reformation can carry the reformation to us too. Images of doors with notices attached, crosses emblazoned, trinity celebrated or doors that invite us into the light, into contemplation of stability and beauty and into transition and change are all welcome.

**Please send images attached to an email to [ELCICcross@gmail.com](mailto:ELCICcross@gmail.com)** indicating the *PHOTOGRAPHER* who took the image and the *LOCATION* where the picture was taken. *Tell the STORY: say something about why you took the image. Include the name of the congregation if appropriate.*

The PCW has asked David Solheim who provided bulletin cover images for three years and prepared the cross images last year to select and prepare the set of images for the bulletin covers again this year. Since the bulletin covers require a square image (like Instagram), Dave will crop your image as need. Dave says that from a practical point of view any jpeg (.jpg) image that is 2.6 MB or more in size can work.

**All images for the first half year need to be submitted before October 7, 2016.**

### Trinity, Windsor Sunday School Help At-Risk Windsor Youth

For the past couple of months the Sunday School children of Trinity, Windsor have thought up, organized, and run a fundraiser and benefit for the Windsor Youth Centre.

The Windsor Youth Centre is a drop in centre for at-risk and homeless youth of Windsor / Essex County between the ages of 16 through 25. From 5 pm to 10 pm Mondays through Saturdays youth can drop in, join in a home cooked meal, help clean up, share stories and events happening in their lives, get help with a resume, and share in community. Ashley, the Assistant Administrator explains that on any given day they see a mix of repeat clients as well as new faces. The centre does have a three year grant from Ontario's Trillium foundation but other than that they rely

totally on donations and help from the community.

Trinity's Sunday School found out from the centre what Windsor's at-risk and homeless youth needed, and then asked the congregation to bring in those personal hygiene and household goods items that were required.

The congregational response was amazing, with many people bringing in everything from shampoo to canned goods to cash. The monetary donations were matched, up to \$250, by a generous member of Trinity. The money was then used to purchase items on the list that had not yet been donated.

On 12 July 2016 I was privileged to join the Sunday School teachers, along with a few of the children, to make the presentation to the Windsor Youth Centre. We found a vibrant group of people, including a few engaging toddlers, who were happy to have a place to go.

In all Trinity donated goods and Walmart gift cards totalling about \$1,000.00. I joyfully congratulate Trinity's Sunday School on an excellent effort helping Windsor's at risk and homeless youth community!

## UW architecture professor lauds seminary renewal plan


